### **Ponder...**

It never fails. Whenever I watch a car race on a relatively open track, like Talladega recently, I am amazed that the engines stay together (for the most part). I will share what goes through my mind, so the next time, you can be awestruck as well.

The pistons in a four stroke engine travel downward, sucking in a fresh mixture of gasoline and air. At the bottom of the stroke they change direction and head upward, compressing the mixture under tremendous pressure and then igniting in an explosion that forces the piston downward (thereby rotating the crankshaft sending power to the wheels) only then to suddenly change direction again, rising to the top and expelling the spent exhaust fumes, and it starts all over again.


The engines at Talladega are turning over 8000 revolutions per minute...lap after lap, foot never

leaving the floor. Do the math and realize what the engineers are designing this engine to do. With each revolution the pistons, and the rods that connect them to the crankshaft, are asked to come to a complete stop and totally reverse their direction 2 times. At 8000 rpm, this happens 16,000 times per minute, or 267 times each second! And we wonder why an engine blows up at times?

Okay, these are specially built race engines. They can do amazing things with all the sponsorship money in the world. But wait! When you step on the gas in your Lincoln Town car to pass someone, the engine may hit 4000 rpm. Does it really make a difference that those big pistons are reversing 134 times each second? That is still amazing to me!!!

So there...now you too can ponder the physics of an engine the next time you see a race, or hear a car or motorcycle winding out down the road. Now you're saying..."gee, thanks a lot!" You're welcome. (If you have any questions, ask Rick Horne. He's a mechanical engineer who made a living keeping race engines together.) *Nick*

He asks the Englishman if he knows why, under French law, he is going to be arrested.




# THE FIRST V-8

WAY BEFORE '55, CHEVY WAS MAKING POWER WITH TWO BANKS

## READER'S QUESTION:

We had a presentation at our Corvette Club tech session last week on the history of the Chevy V-8 from 1955-up, and one of the members mentioned that he had read somewhere that Chevrolet made a V-8 engine during World War I. That was news to the rest of us. Do you have any information on such an engine?

## RESPONSE:

That's correct – Chevrolet did manufacture a V-8 engine in 1917-1918 that was very modern and innovative for its time, used in the Chevrolet Model "D" series.

The engine was 288 cubic inches ( $3\frac{3}{8}$ -inch bore, 4-inch stroke), and had a two-piece iron block, split vertically with the two halves bolted together. Most engines of the day were flatheads with the valves in the block, but the Model "D" V-8 had a central camshaft, pushrods, and overhead valves, with crossflow cylinder heads (intake on one side, exhaust on the other), and the cylinder heads were interchangeable so the same head could be used on both sides.

The lifters and pushrods were exposed, and the valve covers did little more than keep dirt out of the rocker arms and valvesprings, much like the Liberty aircraft engines of the day. It used a Zenith dual-jet updraft carburetor, and the

spark plugs were located on the inboard side of the cylinder heads.

Other innovations included the Kettering electric starter (invented in 1913) with a Bendix drive, and the starter was located within the "V" at the rear, just like on today's Cadillac "Northstar" V-8s. It used a leather-faced, cone-type clutch and a three-speed transmission, when most other cars only had two speeds.

It developed 55 horsepower at 2,700 rpm and 110 lbs-ft of torque, with 4.75:1 compression, suited to the 50- to 60-octane gasoline available in those days, which made it very smooth and powerful compared to the four-cylinder engines used by most of its competition.

Unfortunately, it was also very expensive to produce, and the Model "D" Chevrolet was very costly. As a result, sales were poor, and only about 3,500 were built during 1917-1918. The V-8 was discontinued after 1918, and Chevrolet focused on their bread-and-butter four-cylinder engines in order to remain price-competitive.

V-8s didn't appear again in popular-priced cars until the Ford flathead V-8 60 in 1932. Chevrolet continued to develop their straight-six and introduced the small-block V-8 we're familiar with in 1955.

The 1917-1918 Chevrolet V-8 was very advanced for its time and established the basic overhead-valve architecture later adopted for all high-volume V-8s that appeared across the industry over 30 years later. ■

# Georgia Department of Revenue - Motor Vehicle Division Authentic Historical License Plate Affidavit of Ownership

**THIS AFFIDAVIT MUST BE KEPT IN VEHICLE AT ALL TIMES**



A Georgia license plate issued in 1989 or earlier is authorized for use on the same year model vehicle. The vehicle must be registered for the current year with a Georgia license plate/decals. Current license plate must be kept in vehicle at all times but need not be displayed.

**Purpose of this affidavit:** This affidavit is to be used by the owner of a historical license plate to authenticate the historical status of the license plate.

**Completing this affidavit:** This affidavit must be completed in its entirety, legibly printed in blue or black ink or typed.

**Section A:** Record the authentic Georgia license plate information along with the current Georgia license plate number.

**Section B:** Record the vehicle's information for which the authentic license plate is affixed.

**Section C:** Complete the owner(s)' information. The mailing address block should contain the physical address of the registrant.

**Section D:** Certify ownership of the Authentic Historical license plate and that it is displayed on the vehicle described in section B.

**Section E:** Visual inspection of the plate and vehicle must be completed by a County Tag Agent or authorized employee.

**How to submit this affidavit:** Submit completed affidavit to the county tag office in your county of residence. Please refer to <http://dor.georgia.gov> to locate the county tag office in your county of residence.

The meeting was called to order by president, Raylene Carroll at 7:07 pm. The Pledge of Allegiance to the United States was led by Bill Roberts.

The minutes of the March meeting were approved as published in the newsletter. The Treasurer's report was also approved as printed in the newsletter.

Sponsorship - Don Edwards reported that we have many sponsorships up for renewal during the summer. He reminded all members to patronize those businesses that contribute to us and to let them know we are members of the club. Billy Glover has met with the director of Villa Rica Main Street and learned they have no money in their budget to contribute to us this year. He recommended we reduce their sponsorship to the Gold level as our bylaws require a \$250 monetary contribution for the Platinum level. This was approved by the membership.

Cherrie Glover's sister passed away and we will be giving a donation to the Carroll County Animal Shelter in her honor.

We approved the membership applications of Phillip Wilds and Ken Eckert. There were two other applications tabled because those people were not in attendance at the meeting.

March Cruise-in - Vice-president, Darrell Smith reported he counted at least 95 cars. Although some fine tuning needs to be done the "Cake/Hot Wheel" walk was a success. The number of walks, the name of the event and whether kids and adults walk together needs to be clarified. Rob Kusterer and Matt Bates were thanked for their work on the car cut out for the Hot Wheels. Volunteers for cakes were taken.

Thanks to Michael Valentine our March cruise-in was front page news in the Villa Rican newspaper.

Re-instating the cruise-in set up list was discussed to get more members involved. Darrell Smith will create this list for our 2021 season.

In His Hands Ministry's request for monetary support was once again tabled until we see how our finances are recovering from our limited events due to COVID-19.

Membership discussion - Rob Kusterer led a discussion of ways to increase membership. He polled visitors to our March cruise-in and found several of them do not join because members cars are ineligible for awards at our October Show. His suggestion was to have a separate People's Choice award that only members cars can win. Other suggestions were:

1. Membership drive ads in the newspaper
2. Applications put in cars at our cruise-ins
3. 50/50 tickets sellers give out applications
4. Our greeters give out applications
5. Our club going to more shows and cruise-ins as a group to provide activities for members
6. Putting our past charitable donations on flyers so prospective members will be aware of one our main reasons for existing.
